Shepherding the Shepherds of Haiti

After a first trip with House of Hope last January, it was hard to imagine traveling to Haiti on my own. Without Mike's hard work and know-how, I was pretty sure I would lead a mission team into some kind of catastrophe. God graciously gave me the opportunity, however, to watch and learn over the course of three week-long trips, before entrusting my pastor and me with a team of 10.

What an honor and privilege it was to introduce my church family, Calvary Lutheran of Lincoln, to our dear friends at House of Hope Haiti. Our trip's primary purpose was to provide a seminar for Haitian pastors and evangelists to learn about topics such as counseling, preaching, avoiding burnout, marriage, and conflict resolution.

The seminar was a beautiful success. One hundred men traveled long distances (some for hours each direction each day) to participate, to grow, and to learn. I don't think I've ever seen a more focused, eager group of students. These pastors bravely shared about their experiences following the

earthquake and about their personal struggles caused by the cholera epidemic. We all laughed and cried, and our friends asked more questions than we had time to answer.

All ten people from our team returned home completely changed by what we have seen. We all fell in love with the children at House of Hope and Valley House of Hope (continued on back page)

What God Has Done Through You This Year

Here are some of the things that God has enabled you, our donors and volunteers, to do through the House of Hope Haiti this year:

- Build a new orphanage and take in 43 new children, while continuing to care for and educate the 17 children at the original orphanage.
- Start a new K-4 school for the new orphans and children in the Williamson community.
- Build a new high school and multipurpose building for the Williamson compound.
- Add a 9th grade to the middle school at Williamson & add computer-skills training to the curriculum
- Add a new grade to the K-2 school in the mountain community, where over 60 children are attending school
- Provide the mountain community with bathrooms, a rain-water collection system, seeds and chickens to improve their economy. Finish the church/school building in the mountains, and fix the roof damaged by Hurricane Tomas
- Provide food, medicine, school supplies, clean water, beds, lanterns and other essential items for the children and adults of the ministry
- Hand out Bibles and minister to the people of Haiti through leadership training and spiritual encouragement
- Support and encourage the staff and children of Haiti through your gifts, prayers, emails & messages, and your comforting physical presence when you have visited.

Below is a summary of how House of Hope Haiti donations were spent this year, as of November, 2010. The U.S. board, staff, and volunteers of the House of Hope Haiti are unpaid, and administrative expenses, including travel costs to Haiti, are paid out-of-pocket or donated for that purpose.

You have also donated an estimated \$15,000 in clothes, medicine, supplies, seeds, Bibles, toys, and other non-cash items, which have been distributed to the people of Haiti.

Pray for Groups Going to Haiti Soon

Please pray for two groups going to Haiti soon. A small group will be going December 16-22, and a large group from the Ord, Nebraska, area will go January 1-8. The groups will be bringing supplies and gifts for the children and workers, working with the mountain community to help develop their agriculture, doing Bible studies & VBS, and helping to make the orphanage & schools more comfortable, organized, and secure. The groups are also taking water purification tablets and oral rehydration kits to help the ministry fight the spread of cholera in central Haiti. (As of the writing of this newsletter, violence in Haiti may delay the trips to a future date. Please continue to keep them in prayer.)

Educational Hope for the Region

We are currently offering K-4 grades and 7-9th grades in Williamson. The director of the original orphanage offers a K-6th grade school, and the school in the mountain (Duveger) offers K-2nd grade. Our hope is to add a grade a year in Duveger until it reaches 6th grade. We also hope to add a grade a year in Williamson until it is a K-12th grade school.

Children in Haiti must pass a standardized test to progress to 7th, 9th, 11th, and 12th grades. Our dream is for children from many different schools in central Haiti to attend the high school in Williamson.

A note to sponsors of school children who do not live in our orphanages: we are so thankful for your dedication to these children and to their education. Without your support, they would not be attending school. We wish that we were better able to help you communicate with each child individually, but because the children live in a remote community, and because family situations change, it is difficult to send you updated information on specific children. Our resources are limited there, and so we appreciate your patient and faithful support!!

Our Christmas Wish List

- Finish the buildings, grounds, and fence at the Williamson compound and make them comfortable (about \$5000)
- Add a 10th grade next year and an additional grade each year (about \$7000 per grade per year).
- Open a medical clinic. We have received \$5000 to start, but will have on-going expenses for equipment, medicine, etc.
- Expand wells & water projects (we have been pledged about \$15,000 for our next project, but we will continue to expand)
- Start our fish farm and agricultural training (we have received \$1500 to start, but

will have on-going expenses until it becomes self-sustaining).

- Hire more Haitian staff to help with translating & communicating with sponsors, & to help keep books.
- Our regular expenses for orphans and education are now around \$7000 per month. We depend on your faithful support to continue to care for and educate these children
