

AFTER THE EARTHQUAKE: OUR RESPONSE

When the earthquake rocked Haiti on January 12, 2010, we worried about all of our children and staff in Haiti. We were glad to hear that our sites were just

far enough north to avoid damage. And, as we communicated with our staff there, we learned that immediately following the earth-quake, they went to Port-au-Prince to help dig people out of the rubble and distributed food, water, and medicine. Some of the young people on our Haitian staff who speak English volunteered to translate for medical personnel who came from around the world to help treat the wounded.

Even though the initial crisis is over, the work in Haiti is just beginning. In order to have a lasting impact, we must be committed to help Haiti "for the long haul." The House of Hope can do that by caring for as many orphans as we can, providing education to help the people of Haiti become economically self-sufficient, and sharing the hope that comes from knowing Jesus.

Our ministry is currently caring for 22 new children who were orphaned by the earthquake. We are housing them temporarily at the school site in Wiliamson, while a new orphanage is being constructed. The congregation there has mobilized to provide a family atmosphere for the children. Several church members have been staying with them, caring for their physical needs, playing with them, singing songs and having devotions, and going on outings.

Mobilizing the Valley for Orphans

Eleven of the 26 people who went with us to Haiti in January are from the Valley County, Nebraska, area. After the earthquake, they challenged their community to raise \$25,000 to help build another orphanage for the House of Hope Haiti. So far they have raised about \$21,000! Impressively, the children from the community primary and country schools raised about \$6,000 of this money! These funds have been a real blessing and will allow us to take in more children than we would have. Construction on the **Valley House of Hope** begins this month!



Sponsor an orphan or a school child or give where most needed.

If you have been following along with us on our website or Facebook page, you may wonder why the number of children that we have taken in from the earthquake has changed from time to time. Initially, the children who were orphaned or separated from their families were taken to "tent cities" in Port-au-Prince. Our staff in Haiti went there to bring children to our care, and they were registered with our ministry. In some of those cases, the parents of the children were located, and the children were returned to their families. In other cases, unfortunately, parents brought their children to be taken to an orphanage "for a better life," and have sometimes lied about them being orphaned. When it was discovered that these children had parents, they were also returned to their families. The tragedy of this situation really demonstrates that there is much work to be done yet in Haiti.

If you have agreed to sponsor a child, and that child was returned to his or her family, we will find another child for you to sponsor. We have already taken in more children, and many more will come when we are sure that we can properly care for them. A team of nine people will visit Haiti this month and will work with our Haitian partners to decide when and how to take in more orphans. The new orphanage that we are constructing will have space for between 50 and 60 children. Once that facility is full, we'll pray about what God wants us to do to help more children.

I joined Pastor Lonnie Jacobsen's staff at Calvary Lutheran in September with a goal of finding a place somewhere in the world where we might be able to serve on a regular basis. Even before the earthquake, folks at Calvary were getting excited about doing ministry in Haiti, as they very quickly raised money to pay for my trip and for some Bibles that I was able to take along with me. Along with the rest of the world, our hearts were broken when we heard the terrible news about the earthquake, and many people responded generously by giving offerings to House of Hope. Those initial offerings totaled \$6,600, and money is still coming in. As we observe the season of Lent, our congregation shares a meal every Wednesday night until Easter. Those meals will serve as a fundraiser for House of Hope. As news spread from Calvary about the good work happening in Haiti through House of hope, I received many invitations to speak to groups and raise additional funds. Heartlands church took an offering on behalf of House of Hope. Amy Schmidt, a local recording artist, gave some of the proceeds from her cd release show. And Morely Elementary is in the midst of a school wide fundraiser even now! I have been inspired by people's generosity over the last couple of months, and encouraged by their desire to continue to serve.

The Rotary Clubs in Oberlin and Atwood, Kansas donated \$3.180 towards an internet system that has been installed at the 7-12 grade school in Wiliamson. The students will run an internet business which is referred to as a "Cyber" in Haiti, in order to pay the expenses for the internet fees. Our goal is for the students to gain some valuable work skills as they run the Cyber. In addition, we are hoping that the internet system will allow people to send and receive e-mail messages from the children that they sponsor. If things go well, you'll be able to e-mail your sponsored child by this summer.
